We encourage you to invite friends and family to attend the event and listen to you read!



Her Mother's Eulogy

The daughter sat in the front of the church as the minister gave her mother's eulogy, listening intently for any mention of her own name. Her mother had been a church-goer, and the minister seemed to know her well, her forty-five-year membership in Hancock Congregational Church, her work on the Altar Guild, memberships in the Eastern Star and the American Association of University Women, the many layettes for Church World Service.

No matter how intently she listened, the daughter could not seem to place the person the minister was eulogizing as her mother, as though he had inadvertently begun the eulogy of another dedicated parishioner and upon realizing his mistake had decided to continue, dedicated parishioners being pretty much interchangeable. The daughter remembered going to church with her parents every Sunday as an ordeal to be endured, caught between the two of them in the pew, the minister's voice rendering her completely invisible, her bowels threatening unexpected activity.

Now, the church was full, the elderly enjoying the camaraderie of funerals. Oh, they would say the most thoughtless things after the service, these women in thirty-year-old hats, exclaiming over a family resemblance long gone, recalling her mother's concord grape punch and love of flower-arranging.

She turned her head to look at her father, who was seated on her left. He did not appear to be listening to the minister, his face without expression, his eyes bemused. She wondered if the minister had consulted him about the content of the eulogy. She and her father had not talked much when he called her with the news, just the time of death, which had been imminent for a number of days, and the requisite details of the funeral.

Her mother would be pleased, she supposed, that there was no mention of her antecedents in the eulogy, as though she had sprung full-grown from U.S. soil at the age of twenty-seven, with no long-dead parents buried in the family plot in Nova Scotia and no sisters and brothers and nieces and nephews cluttering up her family tree.

During those last few weeks before her death, the mother had written her obituary herself, in longhand on her own blue stationery, and the daughter had known nothing of it until after she had read the printed version in the *Boston Globe*. After she had already read the printed version, her father showed her the one her mother had written and asked if she wanted a photocopy.

She would make the trip to the hospice once a week, to sit at her mother's bedside with her hands folded in her lap wondering when she should say her good-byes, when she should say those important things which go unsaid for years and must be said when a life is ending. But she did not know what hers were, and she wanted to give her mother the chance to say hers first, and so she waited, hour by hour, in the dimly lighted room, watching her mother's face and listening to the small ordinary sounds of nurses caring for the dying.

The daughter turned her attention back to the eulogy. There it was at last, her name. Her mother's only child. And then the service was over.

Suggestions for Fund Raising at Writers' Events

- Book raffles. Everyone brings 2-4 nice books to donate. They are laid out on a big table so everyone can see them before the event begins, and during breaks. Raffle tickets are 2.00 each. At the end of the event the tickets are pulled, one at a time. The ticket holder can choose the book they want, until all tickets are gone. The remaining books can be either sold for 1.00 each or donated to a local library.
- Book Bingo. This might take longer, but the group could play Bingo. Bingo winners get books. The first winner gets four books, the second winner gets three books, the third gets two books, after that, each winner gets one book. Or some variation of this. Leftover books can be sold for a set amount or donated to a local library
- 50 cent tickets. Authors offer a book of theirs recently published. They are on a table with a slotted can behind them. Players pay 1.00 for a ticket. They put their name on the ticket and put it in the slot in the can by the book they want. At the end of the day, a ticket is chosen from the can at random.

Alice Munro, Nobel Prize Winner And 'Master of The Short Story,' Dies At 92

Alice Munro, the Nobel Literature Prize winner best known for her mastery of short stories and depictions of womanhood in rural settings, has died in Ontario, Canada, May 13, 2024 at the age of 92. The news was confirmed to CNN "with great sadness" by a spokesperson at her publisher, Penguin Random House.

Born in 1931 in Wingham, Ontario, Munro grew up on what <u>she described</u> as the "collapsing enterprise of a fox and mink farm, just beyond the most disreputable part of town" in a 1994 interview with "The Paris Review." Amid familial struggles, Munro found an escape in reading as a child. Her early enthusiasm for renowned writers such as Emily Brontë, Charles Dickens, and Lucy Maud Montgomery, among others, reflected an appreciation for literature beyond her age.

"Books seem to me to be magic, and I wanted to be part of the magic." she told <u>The Guardian</u> of her childhood reading habits. "Books were so important to me. They were far more important than life."
